



Working Group Name: TRANSPORTATION

Meeting Date: Tuesday, March 6th, 2012

Main Points/Discussion: The focus of this meeting was to identify key agencies, resources, and performance indicators for the top recommendations from the Transportation Working Group.

At the start of the meeting, Sam Zimbabwe explained that he and the other Working Group Co-Chair – Ellen Jones – had looked at the group’s work from the last meeting, and some themes started to emerge, which were converted into goals. These goals do not necessarily correspond to the sub-group topics of bike/ped, freight, cars, and transit.

Sam also announced that the working group now has 28 top recommendations. He asked that in this meeting, the group focus on agencies and partners, actions needed, and potential indicators to evaluate the progress of implementing these recommendations. Sam also noted that a working group member – David Wiley – (who could not make it to the meeting) had emailed and asked the group to think about desired outcomes for each of the recommendations when developing indicators for success.

After the meeting, Sam edited the Google doc with the working group’s recommendations to reflect the updates from the meeting. He also looked at both the Working Group rank and the rank from the February 8th Joint Working Group meeting to highlight the top 10 recommendations for the Transportation Working Group. Next Steps: From now until the end of April, the Sustainable DC planning team will be compiling outputs from all of the working groups and developing a draft vision plan for sustainability in the District with an expected release date around Earth Day. The planning team will then use the vision plan as a communication tool to expand community outreach efforts and gather feedback from working group members and the general public. During the spring and early summer, the planning and consultant teams will be calling on working group members



periodically to touch base about the plan drafting, as well as the development of the implementation plan.
