Codes

NHSN	Acute care, ambulatory, long-term acute care, skilled nursing, and outpatient renal dialysis facilities should report these conditions to the National Healthcare Safety Network (NHSN) and provide DC DOH with access to these data. Definitions of these infections are provided in the most current edition of the NHSN manual ( <a href="http://www.cdc.gov/nhsn/">http://www.cdc.gov/nhsn/</a> ).
I	Must be reported immediately by telephone (202) 442-9371 upon provisional diagnosis or the appearance of suspicious symptoms, and confirmed in writing within 24 hours
L	Must be reported to the DC Department of Energy & Environment (DOEE) immediately by telephone (202) 654-6002 or fax (202) 535-2607 if results are $\geq 10$ $\mu\text{g/dL}$ . As a courtesy, all results $\geq 5$ $\mu\text{g/dL}$ should also be reported immediately. Providers must report the case to DOEE by telephone within 72 hours of receiving notification from a laboratory or another provider/facility. Laboratories, including providers who utilize point-of-care testing, are required to report all test results $<10$ $\mu\text{g/dL}$ within 1 week of analysis.
24	Must be reported within 24 hours after provisional diagnosis or the appearance of suspicious symptoms
48	Must be reported within 48 hours after provisional diagnosis or the appearance of suspicious symptoms
*	Only required to be reported by school/child care facilities when there are $\geq 3$ cases that occur in the facility within a 7 day period
